## Debbie's Life



eborah Marie Miller, better known as Debbie, was born 27 April 1984, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, USA to parents William C. and Marcia L. Miller and older sister Deanna. Within a year, the family moved to Fairfax, Virginia, where she attended St. Timothy's School in Chantilly for eight years and was active with the Girl Scouts and various community and private swimming clubs.

Having excelled in school, she attended Thomas Jefferson School for Science and Technology in Alexandria, Virginia, where she also participated on the swim team, winning a state championship. Debbie moved to Houston, Texas, to attend Rice University, known for its engineering school, and majored in Computational and Applied Mathematics. Summer employment during her college years included internships at Northrop Grumman and World Teach (where she taught adults to use computers in a village in Namibia, Africa).

After graduation with distinction at Rice University, Debbie attended the University of London's School of Oriental and African Studies, where she earned a Masters in Political Economy of Development. While living in London, she ventured off to European countries, visited her Uncle Thad in Vietnam, and ran a marathon in Copenhagen, Denmark. She went to work for the Commonwealth Telecommunications Organisation in London for a few years and contributed significantly to development work in the field of radio communications and connectivity in Africa. At a conference for African Government Ministers that she helped to organize in Livingstone, Zambia, in August 2009, she was offered work with ConnectAfrica that she accepted. This enabled her to move to South Africa and Zambia -- her life's ambition -- and work to provide communications (phone and internet) to even more Africans. Debbie passed away on 31 May 2010 (only a few days after her 26th birthday) in Johannesburg, South Africa.
